This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA)

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Sports clubs will be available after school. These will be led by Soccer 2000 coaches and school staff, to encourage increased participation in physical activity in a range of sports.

Across the year there was an increase in participation in after school clubs ranging from multi-skills to indoor athletics. 75% of pupils across year 1 to 4 were taking part in after school sports clubs. The cost allocated was

PE leader and sports coaches provided peer support training sessions. Year 5 and 6 pupils led lunchtime sessions with key stage 2 pupils to begin with. This had a positive impact on fundamental skills such as throwing, catching and invasive game skills. The cost of training and equipment was £300.

All classes across school had the opportunity during the spring term to invite their parents into school for a PE session. The sessions were well attended, with an average of 20 parents for each class. The sessions developed awareness of parents and pupils to a healthy lifestyle but also the fundamental skills that the PE curriculum is developing. The sessions were provided by soccer 2000 coaches and were free
